- Public as spectators in CC debates
- Certain groups underrepresented on climate issues
- Increase public understanding of the problems caused by CC
- Stronger public consent for the policies required to address CC
- Can enable more ambitious policy making
- Stimulate more climate-sensitive behaviour change amongst the public
- Legitimate and just decisions

2. Uninformed


3. Closed-minded

- Representative or diverse sample of citizens
- Barriers to participation lowered
- Balanced information
- Facilitated discussion
- Recommendations
- Institutional Link


The Logic of Climate Assemblies

Note: n=733; Various include all the permanent processes as they regularly address different policy issues. Other include agriculture; consumer protection; migration; water management; youth.







Climate Assembly Diffusion

- Climate on the agenda
- Decline in trust in government
- The 'successes' of the Irish CAs
- Social movements e.g. Extinction Rebellion
- Public engagement practitioners
- Proximity of municipalities & nation states
- Aim to influence the public

Similarities

- Familiar CA format
- Mitigation dominates over adaptation
- Broad Scope
- One-off/ ad hoc



Achievements of Climate Assemblies

- Diverse groups assembled
- Inclusive and respectful deliberation achieved
- Knowledge on climate change and decarbonisation increases
- Assembly members think net zero is more achievable
- Recommendations more ambitious than current policy



Comparing European Climate Assemblies: Variation

- Remit (agent & breadth)
- Evidence & information
- Process design & facilitation
- Duration
- Budget
- Governance (civil servants, parliament, practitioners, AMs, experts, stakeholders)
- Publicity
- Institutional integration
- Policy take-up

Brussels Permanent Climate Assembly

- Started in February 2023
- 65-100 Assembly Members
- Annual rotation
- Each panel addresses a sub-theme of Brussels' climate policy
- Agenda chosen by previous assembly
- Topics to date: habitat and food
- Commission that monitors response to recommendations

- 1. Citizens' assembly model works on climate
- 2. Climate assembly model is transferable across many contexts
- 3. Diffusion to other parts of the globe
- 4. More transnational climate assemblies
- 5. Challenge of scope and time
- 6. More focus on adaptation and systems change
- 7. Democratise climate assemblies
- 8. Broader public engagement
- 9. Integrate with other climate engagement routes
- 10. Improved communication
- 11. Institutionalised/ embedded climate assemblies
- 12. Concern this is a trend that dissipates
